Stephen E. Zlatos Zlatos is a patent attorney representing inventors in patent litigation in federal courts throughout the United States. In 2003, Zlatos was appointed Honorary Consul for the Slovak Republic, with a consulate area that includes the states of Indiana, Kentucky, and Tennessee. He has traveled extensively throughout Central Europe, speaks Slovak, and is active in assisting Indiana companies in developing business ties there.

FROM OUR PRESIDENT/CEO



Little did I imagine one year ago that I would be here at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library serving you our patrons, members, staff, Board of Trustees, volunteers, scholars, visitors, and students. My first several months here have been a whirlwind, from my first BrewNost, to the opening of the Uprka art exhibit, to celebrations of the 100th anniversary of the establishment of Czechoslovakia in 1918, to our current Revolution 1989 exhibit. As we celebrate the historical events that "end in the 8's and 9's" let us pause to think how these events have influenced history. The 1938 Munich Conference changed the geography of Czechoslovakia through

annexation of the Sudetenland. The 1948 Communist takeover of Czechoslovakia challenged the way of life for all Czechoslovaks for decades. However, the resilience and strength of the Czechs and Slovaks endured, and in 1968 the Prague Spring demonstrated that the people wanted democratization and less restriction in media, speech, and travel. The Prague Spring gave us musicians and literary artists such as Václav Havel, Karel Husa, and Milan Kundera. The dedication and persistence of Czechoslovaks led to the Velvet Revolution in 1989, the 30th anniversary of which we are celebrating. This revolution ended 41 years of Communist Party rule peacefully. This year we also celebrate the life of Slovak astronomer, politician, and military leader Milan Rastislav Štefánik; 2019 is the 130th anniversary of Štefánik's birth and the 100th anniversary of his death.

We also remember the 25th anniversary of the Velvet Divorce of 1993, which is when Czechoslovakia split into the Czech Republic (now known as Czechia) and the Slovak Republic (Slovakia). These two countries are examples for the world in how they became two independent nations with no bloodshed and how they remain the closest of allies.

As I reflect on this proud history, I offer this theme: "Celebrate and Remember." Both 2018 and 2019 are significant years of celebration and remembrance, not only for Czech and Slovak cultures but all cultures worldwide. We should discuss with families and friends the meaning of freedom and sacrifice. We should take time to celebrate that we are free because of the sacrifice of thousands who paved the road to democracy and individual worth and dignity. I close with quotes from two great leaders in our path to democracy: "In Life we should strive always to Believe, to Love, and to Work." (Milan Rastislav Štefánik). "Work for something because it is good, not just because it stands a chance to succeed." (Václav Havel, Czech statesman, dissident, and last President of Czechoslovakia). **May our celebrations continue, but may we also reflect on the past to assure our future.**

The Role of Protest Art in the Fall of the Wall Revolution Starts in the Streets Opens April 27

This year the NCSML will commemorate the 30th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall—a historic moment that greatly affected Czechoslovakia and other countries—by building and placing a replica of a section of that wall on its campus as a public art installation. The collaborative public art space will stand from April 27 through Nov. 9, 2019, with opportunities for community members to make their own protest art statements on the wall.

The project, titled **Revolution Starts in the Streets,** also will include residency visits from six artists recognized regionally and internationally for their contributions in public and protest art.

The project's grand opening will be Saturday, April 27, at 1:30 p.m. on the NCSML's grounds and in Rozek Grand Hall. On Nov. 9, there will be a public demolition of the wall to commemorate and recreate the activities in Berlin on the same date in 1989.

Attending the April 27 opening will be Ivan Korčok, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Slovak Republic to the United States, who will speak about his personal experience under communism and the Berlin Wall.

"A common theme in revolution is the presence of art as a form of peaceful protest," says Sarah Henderson, K-12 learning specialist at the NCSML and the project's coordinator. "This wall, by honoring those artists and their freedom of expression, will promote a community conversation around the fall of communism in Europe in 1989 while connecting the conversation to what issues the public may find relevant today."

For this project the NCSML will once again collaborate, as it did with the Guts & Glory World War I exhibit in 2018, with students from

two Cedar Rapids, Iowa, high schools: Iowa BIG and Metro High School's STEAM Academy. Metro STEAM students will work with NCSML staff and Neumann Monson Architects to design and construct the wall. Iowa BIG students are working on programming and promotion for the project, including design, social media, marketing, and public relations.

"Often protest artists under communism were brutally punished by their governments for their acts of protest," says Henderson. "Revolution Starts in the Streets is our effort to educate the public on the above issues and encourage them to take a more active role in contemporary discussions around injustice. We hope to empower the public to think of themselves as artists who can make a difference in our world."

During 2019 the project will host six street artists, several of whom have participated in current and past revolutions. These artists will host public street art workshops on the wall and give public lectures about their experiences in art and revolution.

Th<mark>e artists w</mark>ho will visit as part of Revolution Starts in the Streets are:

- Paco Rosic, Waterloo based artist and Bosnian refugee
- "Ganzeer," Egyptian artist, most known for his work during the 2011 Egyptian revolution
- Jan Kaláb, Czech contemporary artist who began his career after the fall of communism
- Jordan Weber, Des Moines based artist and advocate for youth at risk
- Thomas Agran, Iowa City based artist
- Rose Couch, Los Angeles based artist

Speech Competition for High School Students

On April 9 (5:00 – 6:30 p.m.) the NCSML will host the first annual **Velvet Voices of Freedom Speech Competition** for high school students. Václav Havel was a civil activist of international stature, president first of Czechoslovakia and then of the Czech Republic, and an award-winning author. Havel wrote plays, poetry, and speeches that still inspire millions today. The NCSML seeks to honor this

incredible man and his many diverse talents by initiating the annual Velvet Voices of Freedom Speech Competition. For the first year of the speech competition, all performance entries must be taken from works by Havel. The winner of the competition will be awarded a \$750 scholarship for the winning student to take to the college or university where they are admitted upon graduating high school, and a \$500 prize to be awarded to their school speech department in their honor. Road to College

In June of 2018, the NCSML launched **Road to College**, an education high school program that prepares students for college humanities and social science coursework. Students come to the museum for two-hour classes taught by a college professor for an entire week. The specific topic and professor changes each day so students experience a wide variety of disciplines and teaching styles. In these college-level lectures they discuss assigned readings on complex history topics. The 2018 program covered topics related to World War I and sessions included private tours of museum archives and the NCSML World War I exhibit, *Guts & Glory*.

In June of 2019 we will hold Road to College again, with a theme of *The Fall of the Berlin Wall*; sessions will focus on the seminal year 1989 in honor of the 30th anniversary of the Berlin Wall's demise. Already, faculty are signed up to lecture on political science, history, and art history.

Youth Council

More formally known as the **Cultural Advisory Board of Youth**, the NCSML's Youth Council was formed in February 2018 to assist in making the museum and library a more welcoming space and experience for teens and young people. The group meets at the NCSML four Sunday afternoons a year, in February, May, August, and November. With members from Kennedy High School, Metro High School, and Prairie High School in Cedar Rapids, lowa, area, the Youth Council students already have begun shaping museum programs. Currently the students are working to plan regular public teen programs in the



evenings, including board game nights in the library and video game competitions in the NCSML theatre. Students advise staff on upcoming programs such as the upcoming Velvet Voices of Freedom Speech Competition.

Some members choose to engage with the museum in other ways as well. Jonathon Carrick, for instance, spoke at a museum donor event about his appreciation for their support on the recent exhibition, *Guts & Glory*—a project completed in partnership with Metro High School and Iowa BIG High School. Jonathon helped to build the train cars in that exhibition as a part of his industrial arts education at Metro. Jonathon told the assembled donors, "Being involved in the Youth Council makes me feel more involved in my community and the Czech and Slovak community overall."

Revolution 1989

February 9 – September 8, 2019

To mark the 30th anniversary of 1989's Velvet Revolution in Czechoslovakia, the NCSML tells the story in an original exhibition that features film footage, eyewitness accounts, music, and an array of artifacts. The exhibit will explore the year 1989 as communist regimes worldwide experienced major unrest, including stories from China, East Germany, Poland, and Czechoslovakia.

Visitors will have the opportunity to make their own screen-printed poster in a workshop adjacent to the gallery. Workshop hours are: Mon. -Sat. 11:30–3:30 p.m. and 12:00–4:00 p.m. on Sun. *Sponsored by Western Fraternal Life*.

In Trunks, Hands, and Hearts: What Immigrants Bring to Iowa February 1 – April 20, 2019

In this exhibit explore and celebrate immigration to lowa. Iowa has become home to thousands of immigrants since the state first opened to settlers. This display explores immigration through the objects, skills, and traditions that were and are brought. Thirteen lowa museums and organizations shared stories, artifacts, and historic photos for this traveling banner display.

February 23 - May 27, 2019

Between 1990 and 1997, and then again in 2004 and 2006, Jeremy Sutton-Hibbert photographed the Roma people of Sintesti, Romania. The camp is home to approximately 1,000 Kalderari Roma, predominantly metal workers by tradition. Once nomadic, they now live in Sintesti. Sutton-Hibbert recorded daily life, festivities, traditions, and the working lifestyle of the Roma during a time of substantial change in the post-Communist era. Sponsored by Western Fraternal Life.

Lullaby: Babies in Slovak Folk Dress

April 13 – October 9, 2019

Slovak photographer Monika Klučiarová combines stunning Slovak folk dress (*kroje*) with adorable 10-day old babies to create spectacular portraits. The artist perceives the Slovak folk kroje as mosaics consisting of many details that result in one priceless whole. In addition to the Slovak cultural heritage value, the kroje showcase incredible colors and geometric and other patterns that naturally lend themselves as objects of photographic art. The kroje in this exhibit were tailor-made and embroidered by using traditional processes and techniques by many skilled seamstresses across Slovakia. *Lullaby: Babies in Slovak Folk Dress* will include 36 large, framed portraits. In addition, selections from The Helene Cincebeaux Collection will be displayed next to the portraits, giving visitors a view of authentic folk dress. *Sponsored by Western Fraternal Life*.

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Bazelides Calligraphy

May 11 – August 18 2019

An exhibition featuring intricate calligraphy and delightful paintings. The collection is a gift from Susi Bazelides, a descendant of the two featured artists, calligrapher Vaclav Vane and oil painter Vaclav Janda. Both immigrated to Cedar Rapids from Bohemia in the 19th century.

Medieval to Metal: The Art & Evolution of the GUITAR

Oct. 5, 2019 - Jan. 26, 2020

This touring exhibition organized by the National GUITAR Museum celebrates the artistic development of the guitar. The show features 40 iconic stringed instruments, ranging from an intricately inlaid Moorish oud, a six-foot long Renaissance theorbo, to guitars displaying the modern Italian design of the Eko and one with a stunning transparent acrylic body from California's BC Rich guitars. Spanning centuries of design and craftsmanship, the exhibition takes visitors through the history of an object that is one of the most recognizable items on the planet. *Sponsored by Western Fraternal Life*.

The NCSML Announces Smithsonian Affiliation

The NCSML has been designated a Smithsonian Affiliate, joining a national network of museums, educational institutions and cultural organizations in sharing the resources of the Smithsonian Institution.

"This affiliation with the Smithsonian Institution is a significant recognition for our museum and library. It recognizes our excellence in programs, exhibits, educational activities and in cultural and historic preservation," said NCSML President and CEO Cecilia Rokusek. "It also will enable us to work closely with the Smithsonian in securing additional programs, exhibits, and professionals from the Smithsonian to collaborate with our NCSML staff. And our members will have the opportunity to have joint memberships in the NCSML and the Smithsonian."

There are more than 200 Smithsonian Affiliates in nearly every state, Puerto Rico, and Panama. Created in 1996, Smithsonian Affiliations is a national outreach program that develops long-term partnerships that share Smithsonian collections, build networks, and engage learners with Smithsonian resources. Together, Affiliates and the Smithsonian create life-long learning experiences designed to educate and inspire.

NCSML awarded \$25,000 grant from Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation

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The NCSML been awarded a \$25,000, 3–1 matching grant from the Endowment Challenge Fund at the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation (GCRF). The NCSML has until 2022 to raise \$75,000 for its endowment fund in order to receive the \$25,000 challenge grant from the GCRCF. The GCRCF's Endowment Challenge Fund supports nonprofit organizations in building endowments to create sustainable funding. The funds will remain at the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation in a permanent endowment. This endowment fund will provide annual distributions to the NCSML in perpetuity to support its educational and program initiatives.

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NCSML enters collaboration agreement with major university in Czech Republic

In September 2018 the NCSML and Palacký University Olomouc, one of largest and most prominent universities in the Czech Republic, have formally entered into an agreement to develop and collaborate on joint educational, cultural and research projects. The two institutions have agreed to explore future cooperation on:

- Exchange of scholars and researchers
- Joint sponsorship of courses, study tours, conferences and seminars
- Joint research projects including those eligible for external grant funding
- Exchange of administrative and professional staff
- Exchange of various types of information and resources

NCSML CEO Cecilia Rokusek receives awards from the Slovak Republic

On Oct. 21, 2018, at a meeting in Bratislava of more than 120 Honorary Consuls to the Slovak Republic, NCSML President and CEO Cecilia Rokusek was one of four Honorary Consuls awarded the Silver Medal by Miroslav Lajčák, the Slovak Republic's Minister of Foreign Affairs. Dr. Rokusek has been Slovak Honorary Consul for Florida since 2008. Rokusek was awarded the Silver Medal in recognition and appreciation for her "sustained and enduring contribution to bilateral cooperation and for significant role in promoting Slovakia's reputation abroad."

On Dec. 12, 2018, at the embassy of the Slovak Republic in Washington, D.C., Rokusek was one of the inaugural recipients of the Woodrow Wilson Award. The award, which includes a specially cast bronze medal, was presented to Rokusek and the other inaugural recipients by ambassador of the Slovak Republic to the United States, Ivan Korčok.
