

Our Czech and Slovak homelands endure challenges from many directions as they participate in the leadership in the European Union, the Visegrád Group (V4), and the Austerlitz format. These political and economic alliances form important links that help to bind Central Europe.

# Czech and Slovak Republics Assume Important and Demanding Leadership Roles in Central Europe

On July 1, 2022, the Czech Republic assumed the presidency of the Council of the European Union. It will preside over the Council for a six-month term, which is on a rotation with the other 26 member states, and it has determined an agenda and five priorities.

#### CZ PRES Priorities: Five flagship areas

In a June 15 message, Czech Prime Minister Petr Fiala declared that the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February has necessitated the first priority: to manage the refugee crises through effective European cooperation and solidarity. The goal is to achieve long-term successful integration of refugees into the societies of the EU Member States.

The Russian invasion has created a more intense and urgent need for an accelerated transformation of Europe's energy sector. Though climate protection is of utmost importance, energy independence and security are paramount. The presidency will

package, which includes a faster transition to low-carbon and renewable energy sources, energy savings or more resilient, diversified sources."

focus on "implementing the RePowerEU

The third priority of the presidency is to strengthen European defense capacities and cyberspace security, especially in cooperation with NATO. PM Fiala goes on to say, "In addition, we will seek budgetary support for the renewal of the armaments of European armies."

Supply chain disruptions due to COVID-19 and the Russian invasion have had a devastating effect on the EU economy. To strengthen supply chains and increase economic resilience, the presidency "aims to move forward as quickly as possible with the conclusion of trade agreements with democratic states and to deepen transatlantic

#### Moravian Ornament Painting

CEDAR RAPIDS: Thanks to a "Folk Art Apprenticeship Grant" from the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs, the NCSML was able to partner with expert artists in Moravian art design to help teach a future generation of artists, and to then produce artwork that can be displayed in Czech Village. The project focused on preserving a lost art in the Czech/Moravian culture. This form of art is called "Moravian ornament painting." Two master artists taught emerging artists about the art form and how to do it. As a result of the workshops, emerging artists produced art pieces that will be hung in Czech Village for all to enjoy. Videos of their teaching will be available for future education.

In February, NCSML received a unique musical instrument for its collection: a cimbalom. Made in a workshop in the small Moravian village of Kozlovice in northern Moravia, the instrument was played for more than 10 years by one of the best Czech cimbalom players, Petr Gablas, a native to Uherské Hradiště and member of the folk music group Harafica. The instrument, whose acquisition was financed by Czech-Slovak compatriot Bob Petrik, will not only serve as an item on display in the museum, but will also open the door to cimbalom band concerts in the American Midwest and help teach all generations of Czech and Slovak descent how to play this instrument.

President and CEO Cecilia Rokusek said: "We were absolutely thrilled and honored to have hosted Harafica, the original cimbalom orchestra from Moravia. As the only national Czech and Slovak museum and library in North America, it is important that we bring our cultural stars of the 21st century to our community and our national audiences. We are especially excited to introduce cimbalom music to our children, as the younger generation is truly our future. Harafica represents the finest in terms of history, culture, and unique music that is important to preserve for all generations, current and future. We welcome with open hearts this cultural gem to the Midwest and the heart of America. The cimbalom played for our concert will become part of the museum and will be used to teach all generations interested in this important instrument in the Moravian and Slovak cultures." ■



#### **EXHIBIT HIGHLIGHTS**

#### Righting a Wrong: Japanese Americans and World War II

Petrik Gallery July 23 - October 2, 2022

After Japan attacked Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, and the United States entered a war in Europe and the Pacific, the nation was overcome by shock, anger, and fear — a fear exaggerated by long-standing prejudice against Asians. In response, President Franklin Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066. This order sent 75,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry and 45,000 Japanese nationals to incarceration centers.

Righting a Wrong: Japanese Americans and World War II traces the story of this incarceration and the people who survived it. Young and old lived crowded together in hastily built camps, endured poor living conditions, and were under the constant watch of military guards for two and a half years. Meanwhile, brave Japanese American men risked their



lives fighting for the United States. Some 40 years later, members of the Japanese American community led the nation to confront the wrong it had done—and urged Congress to make it right.

# Gridiron Champs: George Halas and the Chicago Bears

Smith Gallery

March 19 - November 6, 2022

This exhibit features the life and work of George Halas, a first-generation Czech-American who played a significant role in the formation of the NFL, and spent time as a player, coach, and owner with the Chicago Bears.

Visitors can test their football knowledge with an interactive quiz or try some NFL training camp moves. Video screens will feature footage from early games and 1985's Super Bowl Shuffle.



The Second Life of Vendulka V Skala Bartizal Library August 12- December 31, 2022

The exhibition presents the life story of Vendulka Vogelová, a girl who survived the Holocaust. Her story would probably never have made it into written form without the existence of photographs by the Czech photographer Jan Lukas, who photographed the Vogel family only a few hours before their deportation to the Terezín/Theresienstadt ghetto. Eighty years later, Vendulka Vogelová talked about her eventful life and friendship with the photographer Jan Lukas to the author of the book, Ondřej Kundra, who had searched for her in the USA on the basis of the photographs taken by Jan Lukas. Thanks to the Czech Consul General in Chicago for this very important exhibit.



American History will bring heart-wrenching personal stories, fascinating documents, stunning photographs, and engaging interactives. #### September 25 - December 31, 2022

The photographs by Roman Franc in Sokol Loyal Guard show the oldest living members of the Sokol movement from the so-called Loyal Guard of Sokol Brno I and Sokol New York. In the photographs, the aged bodies of former gymnasts assume long-learned poses, in which they suddenly freeze as if they were to stay that way forever.

The portraits of old Sokol members capture the energy accumulated over the years, which may no longer reside in the body, but becomes a matter of the spirit.



Magic and Mystery: Mardi Gras and Carnival Traditions

#### October 29, 2022 - March 19, 2023

All over the world, Carnival celebrations take place in the days leading up to Ash Wednesday and Lent. In the United States, this festival is called Mardi Gras. Czechs call it *Masopust*, and the Slovak word is *Fašiangy*.

This exhibit will feature Czech and Slovak Carnival masks and costumes next to ornate beaded parade costumes from the American south, along with Czech beaded necklaces. Artifacts and images will be borrowed from museums in the United States as well as in the Czech Republic and Slovakia.



#### Memoryscape

#### December 3, 2022-May 6, 2023

Honza Sakař's fascination with the wetcollodion process began around five years ago. His photographs stand as a counterpoint to digital perfectionism, by virtue of being a study, a drive to capture an otherworldly presence.

The exhibit features iconic points of interest in South Moravia, including meadows, forests, castles, historical sites, and local celebrities.



LEADERSHIP ROLES continued from page 1 cooperation within the EU-US Trade and Technology Council (TTC), with an emphasis on strategic cooperation."

Finally, the fifth flagship and overall objective of the presidency is to contribute as much as possible to creating the conditions for the security and prosperity of the EU. Together with the United States and other democratic states, the EU should become a strong foundation for a strategic community defending fundamental values, human rights, a free way of life, and liberal democracy.

#### Strategic Alliances Increasingly Important

With its close geographic proximity to Ukraine, Slovakia is on high alert. Concurrently with the Czech EU Presidency, 2022-2023 is the year of Slovakia's presidency of the Visegrád Group (V4—the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, and Slovakia). In addition to the V4, it is also involved in another regional group, Austerlitz (the Czech Republic, Slovakia and Austria). With these memberships and collaborations, they are actively addressing problems jointly faced by Central Europe.

Pavol Demeš, a member of the NCSML International Advisory Board and the first of NCSML's Visiting Scholars this coming fall, explains that participating members of the EU, Austerlitz and the V4 are standing in standing in solidarity against the Russion agression in Ukraine.

Member nations facilitate and help to house and support huge numbers of Ukrainian refugees as they cross borders throughout the continent.

They share the challenges of economic strife, of developing and utilizing technology, and overcoming the consequences of the global pandemic.

It has been an honor to be a Smithsonian Summer 2022 Intern in partnership with the Emerson Collective Youth Collaboration and the NCSML, a Smithsonian Affiliate. The internship spanned an eight-week period; six weeks were spent remote, and two weeks were spent on site at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. During the remote part of the internship, I spent my time researching and attending Zoom lectures about poverty, media impact, curating a diverse museum, etc. An impactful Zoom meeting mentioned that many people have made accidental discoveries in museums. I, myself, made a discovery!

The NCSML has an exhibit on George Halas, with Czech ancestry from the Pilsen area in Chicago, Illinois. George Halas was a player and owner of the Chicago professional football team, the Bears. As I went through the exhibit, I could not help but think about how strange it was that George Halas was from Pilsen. I kept seeing the importance of this community intertwined with his story. I am from the South Side of Chicago, and I did not know Pilsen had Czech and Slovak influences. This neighborhood is now predominantly Mexican while experiencing gentrification.

Often, we live in areas without knowing the culture that resides around us. Through my two weeks that I have spent at the NCSML, I have learned about the preservation of culture, curating exhibits and being more adventurous. I spent a lot of time learning about culture preservation through cuisine. I was reading a book called *Food Lore Folklore Cookbook* by the Czechoslovakian-American

Social Club in Tucson, Arizona. The essay submitted by Shirley Masa Jakimowich stood out to me as Shirley talked about Cermak Road, which is named after the Czech Mayor, Anton J. Cermak. When she lived on Cermak Road, it was a famous street of Czech bakeries, butcher shops, florists, taverns, savings and loans, and restaurants. She recalled famous restaurants — "Klas" and "Old Prague." Cermak Road was the main street of Czechoslovakia in Chicago, Cicero, and Berwyn. I, myself, go on Cermak Road almost every day, as Cermak Road remains the heart of these neighborhoods. But I visit them for a new reason. Cermak Road is now predominately Mexican too. The restaurants and shops she mentioned are long closed as the area shifted in its ethnic population.

I worked alongside Stefanie Kohn, the exhibit curator of the NCSML, to learn about curating a museum. The museum was preparing to open the *Righting a Wrong* exhibit, showcasing the Japanese experience in America. This is a traveling exhibit from the Smithsonian. From afar, one would think the museum only focuses on Czech and Slovaks, but it creates an inclusive atmosphere for all to come and learn about immigration and participate in a fascinating culture.

I would like to thank Dr. Cecilia Rokusek, my supervisor Michelle Simoneau, executive assistant to the NCSML President and CEO, and their husbands for their hospitality throughout my trip. I would also like to thank the employees at the NCSML for welcoming me with open arms, and the Smithsonian and Emerson Collective for this opportunity.

## Chicago's Czech Legacy

Manifest Film's new 90-minute documentary film, *Czechs in Chicago*: A Home in the Heartland, tells the story of the Czech immigrant experience in Chicago, past and present. Spanning nearly two centuries of turbulent times, it shows how the Bohemians helped build and shape the city, and what Chicago did in turn, to empower them to thrive in a new land and help establish a free and sovereign Czechoslovakia.

Our documentary was completed in May of this year, and had its preview theatrical screening in the Gene Siskel Theater at a special event sponsored by the Czech Consulate of Chicago. It had its television premiere on Chicago PBS, WTTW, with a very enthusiastic audience response and extraordinary Nielsen TV ratings for the entire week it aired.

At the dawn of the twentieth century, Chicago had the third largest Czech population in the world, behind only Prague and Vienna. The sizeable presence of Czechs in the city was evident in the names of neighborhoods like Pisek, Praha, Pilsen, and Ceska Kalifornie — or sites like the Bohemian National Cemetery,



Sokol lodges, Pilsen Park, and Thalia Hall—and in the emerging political career of the Czech immigrant Anton Cermak, born in Kladno, Bohemia. Cermak would be elected mayor of Chicago in 1931 as a Democrat. He became known as the George Washington of the Democratic machine, and we see how he strove to bring together the working, immigrant classes of Chicago. He was the first immigrant mayor of a major American city.

The film portrays how the Czechs in the "Windy City" also worked for the independence of their homeland from the repressive Austro-Hungarian Empire, providing funds and support and frequently hosting one of the eventual founders of an independent Czechoslovakia, Tomáš Garrigue Masaryk. Chicago was a major hub of activity that ultimately brought freedom and sovereignty to the Czechs following World War I.

Our goal in creating Czechs in Chicago is to foster in all generations an indelible sense of their own Czech and Czech American cultural identity, history, and heritage, while informing and arousing in viewers, no matter what their nationality, a strong curiosity about their own cultural heritage.
